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Event Summary

1 2023-2024 The 1st Guia Lecture "The Misinterpreted Demise of Qin Keqing: A Multifaceted Analysis Blending Socio-Legal and Redology"

The 1st "Guia Lecture" of the 2023-24 academic year, titled "The Misinterpreted Demise of Qin Keqing: A Multifaceted Analysis Blending Socio-Legal and Redology", was successfully held on 8 September, 2023, at the E31 Student Activity Centre Theatre of the University of Macau. The "Guia Lecture" leverages Chinese Confucianism to expand Macao's global culture, fostering cultural exchange among diverse cultures in Macau, China and beyond. It provides a platform that enables interdisciplinary, high-quality, and international academic exchanges.

This lecture delved into the character "Qin Keqing" from one of China's Four Great Classical Novels, "A Dream of Red Mansions." Professor Ke initiated her exploration by scrutinizing suicide incidents involving several female characters within the novel. Later, Professor Ke examined the uncertainties surrounding Qin's





demise and embarked on an insightful investigation into the intricate issue of incestuous relationships within families during the Qing Dynasty. Particularly, the lecture shed light on the distressing prevalence of father-in-law and daughter-in-law incestuous affairs, which regrettably lacked adequate legal remedies.

Professor Ke further delved into the analysis of legal provisions regarding the "Act of compelling an individual to commit suicide" during the Ming and Qing

Dynasties. Her discourse highlighted a critical aspect – individuals who instigated others to commit suicide for reasons beyond official duties could potentially bear criminal responsibility. This illuminating perspective underscored that the victims of sexual crimes, by choosing suicide as a means to hold the perpetrators legally accountable, were engaging in a rational form of resistance. Professor Ke's insights enriched our understanding of the legal backdrop surrounding Qin Keqing's tragic end.



In addition to these explorations, the lecture also probed into the potential motives behind the alteration of the narrative surrounding Qin's demise. It scrutinized the intentions of the annotators and the author, Cao Xueqin, revealing intriguing inconsistencies within the narrative. Finally, Professor Ke emphatically emphasized that Qin was a victim of sexual crimes, and her decision to end her own life was an act of seeking justice. Through this narrative lens, it exposed a prevalent societal evil during the Qing Dynasty, providing a searing critique of the darker aspects of the legal system and the pervasive discrimination and injustices faced by women.

This lecture has provided a fresh, cross-disciplinary perspective on the interpretation of "Qin Keqing's Demise." It drew enthusiastic participation from over two hundred attendees, including scholars and students from diverse academic disciplines and institutions, both locally and internationally. The lecture ignited lively discussions, particularly on contemporary issues pertaining to the protection of women's rights and the sociological exploration of suicide-related topics.

2 ZUMRI & IAS Humanities and Social Sciences Lecture "Writing about the daily life of modern Chinese cities – Big issues in small teahouses"

The ZUMRI & IAS Humanities and Social Sciences Lecture, entitled "Writing about the daily life of modern Chinese cities – Big issues in small teahouses," was successfully held on 15 September, 2023, at ZUMRI. Professor Di Wang narrated the urban history of teahouses and people's lives, along with social changes. This collaboration between ZUMRI and IAS aims to facilitate the synergy effects of academic resources and promote collaboration and exploration in the humanities, science, and technology fields.

During the Western Expansion in China by the early 2000s, the society of Chengdu was deeply worried that cultural practices such as playing mahjong and sipping tea might convey a negative image of the city as slow-paced and lacking ambition. After years of development, Chengdu successfully transformed into a first-tier city in China. However, its rich traditions of mahjong and teahouses remain the same.



The teahouses that serve as a public sphere have faced many challenges during the social changes. The development of teahouses reached its peak during the Republican period. The teahouses experienced a gradual decline in the 1960s but have steadily recovered after the period of Reform and Opening-up. In the early stage of Socialism, the resources were in the hands of the state, unauthorized cultures were diminished, and traditional performances in the tea houses were changed to suit the policies. Teahouses are the models that reflect how political cultures affect society.

Professor Wang believed that the success of Reform and Opening-up can be attributed to the government's decreased level of control and intervention in public affairs. This allowed the city to operate with its own vitality. The current commercialization has limited space for small teahouses. Professor Wang claimed that only time can tell us whether teahouses will survive and thrive in the decline of local culture. During the lecture, Professor Wang shared his publishing experience. He claimed that research and writing should rely on rigorous methods and strict language. Moreover, academics may attempt to present articles by historians with straightaway and simplified forms to engage young readers who may not find traditional historical texts appealing.

Professor Wang also shared stories from his field studies while preparing for his publication. Those daily stories have given teahouses a valuable and unique role in people's lives. At the end of the lecture, Professor Wang said that historians might lose their research focus due to the repetitive and predictable nature of daily life. However, only the prosperous and stable lives of the people can be combined into a great narration.



3 The IAS team visited Zhuhai UM Science & Technology Research Institute

The IAS team led by Associate Directors Professor Di Wang and Professor Bing Shui, visited the Zhuhai UM Science & Technology Research Institute (ZUMRI) and received a warm welcome from Professor Chunming Wang, the Deputy Director of ZUMRI.

The team visited three research centers: the Advanced Materials Research Center, the Smart City R&D Center, and the Chinese Medicine and the translational Medicine R&D Center. Professor Chunming Wang introduced the usage of the smart city and IoT applications on traffic and public safety. He also shared the



research collaborations between the university and companies, with the goal of nurturing talents in related fields.

Professor Shui appreciated the interdisciplinary platform and geographical advantages of ZUMRI and was excited about the potential collaboration which would promote multidisciplinary interaction and dialogue in humanities and sciences. The Head of Academic Programme and Publication of IAS, Professor Shaoyang Lin praised the industry-academia collaboration research strategy, he also mentioned that the visit helped the team gain a deeper understanding of ZUM-RI's current scientific research development.

Professor Shui and Professor Lin presented Professor Chunming Wang with a pennant to express our gratitude at the end of the visit. Both parties had in-depth discussions and expressed their hope to strengthen exchanges and potential collaborations in the future.





4 Symposium on Therapeutic Jurisprudence

The Symposium on Therapeutic Jurisprudence, organized by the University of Macau, the Institute of Advanced Studies in Humanities and Social Sciences, the Faculty of Law, the Equality Rights Project, and HKU Space Law, was successfully conducted via Zoom on 28 September 2023. This symposium was a significant academic event that epitomized the university's commitment to a global academic perspective rooted in Macau and was the first symposium on this topic in Chinese society.

Therapeutic jurisprudence is an interdisciplinary study of the therapeutic and anti-therapeutic aspects of laws and public policies, as well as legal institutions and dispute-resolution systems. This approach values psychologically healthy outcomes in legal disputes and transactions. The symposium featured a distinguished lineup of speakers who delved into various aspects of therapeutic jurisprudence. The keynote speakers, Professor David Wexler and Professor Michael Perlin provided valuable insights into the origins and applications of therapeutic jurisprudence, especially in the context of mental health law in the United States. Their presentations highlighted the potential for therapeutic jurisprudence to reshape the legal landscape and prioritize therapeutic outcomes for individuals with mental disabilities.

In the panel sessions, Professor Richard Wu's presentation on well-being in law school and practice underscored the critical need to address the unique challenges faced by law students and practitioners. He introduced mindfness as a tool to enhance emotional and mental health in the legal profession, emphasizing the importance of self-compassion and awareness.

Peng Ding's exploration of therapeutic jurisprudence for people with focused on shifting from traditional therapeutic approaches to a rights-based perspective. He highlighted the significance of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and the positive duties of states to ensure equal access to justice. His presentation discussed the evolving concept of therapeutic jurisprudence and emphasized the importance of inclusivity in the justice system.

Becky Leung's research on the cumulative disadvantages faced by individuals with psychosocial disabilities in the Magistrates' Courts of Hong Kong revealed significant disparities in the legal process. Her findings highlighted the urgent need for reforms to ensure equal treatment and support for individuals with disabilities in the criminal justice system.





Bo Chen's comprehensive analysis of the implementation of mental health law in China, focusing on the reduction of restrictive measures in psychiatric facilities, provided critical insights into the challenges and opportunities within the Chinese legal system. His presentation emphasized the importance of clear policies, training, and a deeper understanding of mental health law to minimize restrictive measures.

Simon Ng's presentation on access to justice for people with communicative disabilities brought attention to the challenges faced by this vulnerable group within the criminal justice system. His discussion of real-life cases illustrated the need for effective communication, procedural accommodations, and increased awareness within the legal process.

In his concluding remarks, Professor Xingzhong Yu expressed gratitude to all participants. He recognized the symposium's significance as a starting point rather than an endpoint in the journey of therapeutic jurisprudence. Professor Yu highlighted the need for continued communication and collaboration in promoting therapeutic jurisprudence, especially in Asia, where awareness of the field is still limited.

The Symposium on Therapeutic Jurisprudence brought together scholars, practitioners, and students from diverse academic backgrounds and institutions, both locally and internationally. It provided a platform for insightful discussions on applying therapeutic jurisprudence principles to enhance well-being, promote inclusivity, and address systemic challenges within the legal system. The symposium's success emphasized the importance of interdisciplinary approaches and international perspectives in advancing therapeutic jurisprudence.
